


as recognized in the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (GBF).





























THE 'PROMISE' FILM

Anchored by the words of emerging youth leader Erika Kawarim and the small Amazon community of Chichirat, the film seizes the current moment of changing global consciousness to illustrate that for Indigenous guardians to continue to protect their thriving territories, world leaders must fulfill their promises.




OUR KEY MESSAGES

Indigenous Peoples' guardianship is critical to fulfilling the promise of protecting 30% of Earth's lands and waters by 2030.

It is crucial to ensure that Indigenous rights, cultures, lifeways, and wisdom are safeguarded throughout global efforts to achieve the 30X30 target.





Nearly 50% of globally threatened mammals find protection in Indigenous lands.




